#### **BOX ELDER**

**Box Elder** (*Acer negundo*) 'Sensation' is a moderate to fast statuesque tree species that grows to a height of approximately 9-12 metres and forms a rounded crown.

New foliage is mid-green in colour with a hint of red when young, that is borne on red stalks. Foliage turns bright red, orange and yellow in autumn.

Will thrive in a wide range of soils and can tolerate wet or drought conditions.

Note: These trees can be viewed in Market Corner, Fulham Gardens and Sydney Avenue, Kidman Park.





## **CALLERY PEAR - CHANTICLEER**

The Callery Pear (Pyrus Calleryana) 'Chanticleer' species produces an upright narrower, conical habit making it very suitable for areas where less canopy width is desired. The tree is suited to a range of site conditions from dry to alkaline soils. During the spring it has white flowers produced in large corymbs. In summer it has excellent green foliage which changes to bright burgundy and scarlet during autumn. It has a moderate growth rate, to a height of approximately 11 metres and an eventual width at maturity of approximately 6 metres.

Note: These trees can be viewed in Ray Street, Findon, Angley Avenue, Findon and Price Weir Avenue, Allenby Gardens.



# **CHINESE PISTACHIO**

The Chinese Pistachio (Pistacia chinensis) is a small, deciduous tree that reaches a height of approximately 5-7 metres. This species is well known for its extremely fine, glossy, green leaves consisting of up to 10 pairs of leaflets which, in autumn, turn a bright crimson colour. The inconspicuous flowers in clusters are followed in summer by small, red, spherical seed pods that turn blue in autumn and attract birds.

Note: Young trees can be viewed in Whitney Street, Cheltenham, Telford Street, Ovingham, Princes Street, Croydon and Laurie Street, Kidman Park.



## **CHINESE TALLOW**

The Chinese Tallow Tree (Sapium sebiferum) has a moderate growth habit, growing to a height of approximately 6-8 metres. The leaves are bright green in colour with a paler underside. They become bright reds, oranges, yellows, and purples in autumn. The tree is monoecious, producing male and female flowers on the same plant. The greenish-yellow flowers occur in terminal, spike-like inflorescences in spring.

Note: These trees can be viewed in Coppins Terrace, Fulham Gardens and Dudley Avenue, North Plympton.

## **COASTAL BANKSIA**

The **Coastal Banksia** (Banksia integrifolia) is a fast-growing, compact, Australian native tree which grows to a height of approximately 5-10 metres. The leaves are dark green and silvery white beneath and are 100-150mm long and 20-30mm wide. The flower spikes 75-150mm long and 60-80mm in diameter are greenish yellow in colour. The Coastal Banksia will grow well in coastal areas.

Note: These trees can be viewed in Recreation Parade, Semaphore Park, Henley Avenue, Henley Beach and Granville Street, Semaphore Park.



# **CORAL GUM**

Coral Gum (Eucalyptus torquata) is a small tree reaching up to 6-8 metres in height, which has a slender trunk and a rounded crown. Leaves are dull grey with reddish margins and a prominent mid rib. Generally, flowers are red to pink and appear during summer and autumn, followed by urn-shaped, ribbed, woody capsules. The tree is native to Coolgardie district of southern Western Australia.

Note: These trees can be viewed on Phillips Street, Henley Beach South.



## **CREPE MYRTLE**

The Crepe Myrtle (Lagerstroemia indica) is a deciduous round-headed tree which grows to a height of approximately 4 metres and enjoys full sun. Leaves are small and dark to lite green, changing to yellow to orange in autumn. New foliage begins to appear in September. Flowers have crinkled petals which appear from January to April and can last for up to three months. The flower colours vary from white, pink, rose, mauve and crimson.

Note: These trees can be viewed in Paqualin Street and Bayly Street, Hendon, and Elgin Street, Woodville Park.



# **EUKY DWARF**

**Euky Dwarf** (*Eucalyptus leucoxylon*) is a small tree growing to a height of approximately 7 metres. The grey-green leaves are 80-150 mm long.

Flowers are mostly pink but occasionally a tree will have yellow flowers, which are produced from late-Autumn to Summer.

Note: These trees can be viewed in Zephyr Grove and Lower Street, Semaphore Park.



#### **EUROPEAN HACKBERRY**

The European Hackberry (*Celtis australis*) is a medium-sized deciduous tree which grows to a height of 12 – 15 metres. Small ovate to elliptical leaves with toothed margins are dark green in colour, which turn yellow in autumn. The tree has small, fleshy, fruits (drupes) which turn purple/black in autumn. It is often used as street and shade tree in public areas.

Note: Mature trees can be viewed in Wattle Street, Brompton and Lewanick Street, Allenby Gardens.



# JAPANESE ZELKOVA 'Green Vase'

The Japanese Zelkova (Zelkova serrata Green Vase) is a moderate to fast-growing, medium sized tree with a vase shaped habit which grows to a height of approximately 14 metres and has a spread of 10m. The bright green ovate leaves have distinct serrated margins which turn to various colours ranging from soft yellows to orange and rusty reds in Autumn. It grows well in well drained soils and likes full sun.

Note: These trees can be viewed in Post Parade Cheltenham, Eden Street, St Clair





## **GOLDEN RAIN TREE**

The **Golden Rain Tree** (Koelreuteria paniculata) is a deciduous, wide-crowned tree, 7 metres tall with a single or divided trunk. The tree has large, pinnate leaves (25-35cm) with long, showy clusters of deep yellow flowers in summer, followed by papery pods which resemble Chinese lanterns.

The mid-green leaflets turn deep golden yellow to orange in autumn. The Golden Rain Tree will grow well in hot and fairly dry conditions in gardens, parks and streets.

Note: These trees can be viewed in Westbourne Street, West Croydon, Alicia Street, Athol Park and McDonnell Street, West Hindmarsh.



# **JACARANDA**

The Jacaranda (Jacaranda mimosifolia) is a fast-growing, exotic tree with a spreading canopy, which can grow to a height of approximately 10 metres. The most striking feature of the Jacaranda is the purple-mauve flowers which hang heavy on the dark branches. The flowers grow to about 5cm long and adorn the branches in late spring. The tree features fern-like foliage which remains until late winter and flat woody seed pods. The deciduous Jacaranda enjoys warm areas and little water.

Note: These trees can be viewed in East Avenue, Beverley and Valetta Road, Kidman Park.



## **NATIVE FRANGIPANI**

The **Native Frangipani** (Hymenosporum flavum) is a fast-growing Australian Native which grows to approximately 6-10 metres in height. This narrow, erect tree with fine branches and an open crown has dark green, glossy leaves with fragrant, cream-white to yellow flowers, 20-25mm across from October to December. It will tolerate full sun or partial shade and is drought and frost resistant. This tree is native to Queensland and New South Wales.

Note: These trees can be viewed in the car park behind the Civic Centre on Woodville Road, Woodville.



#### **SOUTHWORTH DANCER - ORNAMENTAL PEAR**

The Ornamental Pear (Pyrus betulaefolia) 'Southworth' Dancer differs from the typical plant, with Birch-like foliage that looks as if the foliage dances in the breeze. It grows to a height of 7 metres and a spread of 5 metres. White flowers appear in the spring with bright

purplish-red stamens. New foliage is silvery grey, turning mid green with serrated margins on long petioles and on slender branches. The foliage turns yellow in autumn. Inedible, russet-coloured fruits are produced after flowering. This tree is best in full sun and is proving to be tough and durable.

Note: These trees can be viewed on Tunbridge Street, Woodville South and Gail Road, Fulham Gardens.



## **ORNAMENTAL PLUM - OAKVILLE CRIMSON SPIRE**

The Ornamental Plum (Prunus cerasifera) 'Oakville Crimson Spire' is a deciduous, fastigiate tree with branches almost parallel to the trunk, and grows to a height of approximately 6 metres and 2 metres in spread, enjoying full sun. Young foliage emerges are reddish bronze then darkening with age. White flowers with pinkish red stamens are in clusters of 3-5 and appear early to mid-spring. Small, globose fruits may occur under some conditions. This tree species likes a variety of site locations, but does prefer moist, well-drained soils.

Note: These trees can be viewed in Spence Street, Albert Park and Grayson Street, Kilkenny.



## S.A. BLUE GUM

The **S.A Blue Gum** (*Eucalyptus leucoxylon*) 'Rosea' is a medium sized, Australian native tree which grows to a height of approximately 8-12 metres and has a spread of 5-7 metres. The grey-green leaves are 80-150 mm long and smooth bark which is light grey to white in

smooth bark which is light grey to white in colour. Pink to red flowers develop from buds in groups of three with a 10 mm conical cap from spring to summer. This tree is drought and coastal tolerant. It is useful for ornamental, windbreak and street planting.

Note: These trees can be viewed along Island Drive, Corcoran Drive and Delfin Drive, West Lakes.



## **WILGA**

The Wilga (Geijera parviflora) is an evergreen, Australian Native tree, which is slow growing and will reach to a height of approximately 6-9 metres. It has pendulous foliage and clusters of small, white flowers, scented similar to citrus. The Wilga is a hardy shade tree which tolerates drought and is ideal as a street tree.

This tree is indigenous to the east coast of Australia from Queensland to Victoria.

Note: These trees can be viewed in Baker Street, Renown Park and Worthley Road, Findon.



# **TUCKEROO**

The **Tuckeroo** (Cupaniopsis anacardioides) is a fast-growing tree which grows to a height of approximately 6-10 metres. The leaves consist of 5 to 9 oblong, leathery, shiny leaflets, 15-25 cm long. A cluster of greenish-yellow flowers, 30 cm long, appear in autumn and winter followed by orange to yellow fruit.

The Tuckeroo is an attractive tree ideal for planting in streets and parks.

Note: These trees can be viewed in Dunstone Road, Semaphore Park, Boyce Street, Seaton and Torres Avenue, Flinders Park.
